Happy New Year to one and all. I hope you all had a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year celebration. As you know, we will be having our Stated Meeting on January 8th this year since the New Year started on our regular stated meeting night. I hope to see many of you in the lodge that night.



The first quarter is always busy due to people moving into their new positions, finishing up degrees and our regular activities. This year will be no exception. Please take a close look at the calendar for January and February since we will be having quite a few activities.

I have to put in a reminder to our various committees and boards that in February a number of reports are due. Per the CMC, these reports must be written and submitted to the secretary for inclusion with the minutes as well as read in lodge. That being stated, I want to take the

Volunteers have the time; they just have the heart. opportunity now to thank all the members who have either volunteered to be on a committee or accepted my request to be on one. I appreciate the hard work and efforts required of you. Thanks to each of you.

Each year a number of changes occur along with a change in leadership, both in grand lodge and in the

Blue Lodge. We have a number of first time line officers and they are actively supporting the lodge. In return, we have to give them our support as well. One of the things that they have requested (and me too) is a regularly scheduled officers meeting. Accordingly we will be having officers meetings on the Tuesday night prior to Stated Meetings. On that night we will set the agenda for the Stated Meeting as well as plan the calendar and activities for upcoming events. Furthermore, we intend only to conduct business on those items that are on the Stated Meeting Agenda. Only items deemed of major importance or required by Grand Lodge will be considered extemporaneously. Anything else will be ruled out of order unless it is of an emergency nature. Those items will be put on the following month's agenda. This hopefully will have two benefits. One, shorter business meetings, and two, more time to inform the lodge members, allow discussion and better decision making process.

At least that is the anticipated results. If you have something that needs to be discussed, be sure to contact us before or during the officers meeting to get it on the agenda.

Another item that I am concerned about, is that we have become lax in our respect for the lodge



and some of its traditions. Starting in March, it will be mandatory for all Officers to attend in dark suits (Dark jacket, Tie, Shirt, slacks and dress shoes will be permissible if you do not have a dark suit). This has been discussed with many of the officers already and they are in agreement with this. Additionally, I would like to bring back an old tradition and will ask that all officers wear white gloves while we are at labor (in accordance with the guidelines provided by Grand Lodge of course). I will personally purchase the first bulk order of gloves (not to exceed

\$100.) for this activity, so as not to burden the lodge and to put my money where my mouth is. I also request that members attending lodge wear slacks and nice shirts. (no leans or tennis shoes) to stated meetings, with the exception of those that are working in the kitchen. I do not consider this an undue hardship. These standards (or higher) are reguired of our youth groups and even other concordant bodies. We should at least be an example to our youth groups.

Other items that we hope to do are improve our candidates experience during the degrees as much as possible. To that end, I hope to have each candidate experience his own degree in its entirety. The only time I intend to have double degrees are if it is requested by the candidates themselves. (An Example might be a pair of brothers, father /son, etc.) I have appointed the Senior Warden as head candidates coach. No proficiencies will be scheduled to be performed in lodge, unless I receive word from him that he has heard the candidate give his proficiency and agrees that he is ready. The only time I will hear proficiency is if the Senior Warden asks me to in the case he is not available due to work or some other conflict.

We had a number of Masons pass away this year and I and the secretary are including a Memorial page listing those persons who have passed away. These people were not mentioned earlier during the last year because we were not informed of their passing until after their families received dues notice requests and informed us of their passing. Please take a moment to pay these brothers your respects. Perhaps if you were friends with them and their families, extend a kind thought to

The Fellowcraft degree is very impressive, and I hope you can attend the Fellowcraft degrees coming up in January.





As we start a new year, here are some facts about our lodge.

California Masonic Foundation: Partnerships for Profound Change

Masons have championed many great causes throughout history, but perhaps none as far-reaching, or as personal, as public education.

Masons started some of the first public schools in America and advocated for legislation to help make education accessible to everyone.

In addition, California Masons are committed to making a profound difference in our communities. By partnering with respected organizations, the California Masonic Foundation provides meaningful support where there is a critical need. These partnerships touch the lives of thousands of Californians each year.

The Alisa Ann Ruch Burn Foundation's Firefighters in Safety Education (F.I.S.E.) offers California Masons the unique opportunity to partner with a statewide nonprofit organization making profound change in communities throughout California through a public burn prevention education program. The Firefighters in Safety Education provides free burn prevention education and materials to thousands of elementary school students every year. The goal is to bring burn prevention education to "each child, each year" in California schools. The program is a 30-minute presentation taught by active firefighters who volunteer to be trained and to bring lifesaving information to their communities.

A Statewide Partner – Alisa Ann Ruch Burn Foundation

The Masons of California have established a partnership with the Alisa Ann Ruch Burn Foundation (AARBF), a California based non-profit organization founded in 1971 after the tragic death of Alisa Ann, an 8 year old girl who died in a fire-related accident.

AARBF has been widely recognized for its accomplishments:

- In 1972, AARBF created the Stop, Drop and Roll marketing campaign, now a life-saving technique taught in schools worldwide;
- In the early 1980s, AARBF introduced the largest residential summer camp in California for burn impacted children, called Champ Camp;
- In 2009, the Federal Emergency Management Agency recognized AARBF nationally for its scald prevention campaign, Hot Liquids Burn Like Fire; and,
- In April 2012, the American Burn Association's Journal of Burn Care and Research published an abstract describing the Firefighters in Safety Education (SFFISE) program.

Understanding Our Unique Opportunity

- There are 2.9 million students in California and this project targets 70,783 low income students throughout California.
- Lodges can raise funds to bring FISE to schools in their community so we can provide FISE materials, training, and guidance.
- AARBF will help interested lodges reach out to their local schools to set up presentations and recruit local firefighters to make the presentations.
- AARBF will provide the FISE materials and train both Masons and firefighters. This option increases the sustainability of the FISE expansion and furthers our goal of presenting FISE to every K-5 school in California that desires to teach its students burn prevention skills.

How Our Partnership Will Work

- Lodges throughout California will raise funds to provide vital burn prevention education to low income students throughout the state of California.
- The cost to provide burn prevention education through the Firefighters in Safety Education program is approximately \$1.00 per child. The goal is to reach 70,78: students every year for three years.
- AARBF will establish relationships with the local fire department(s) to adopt the Firefighters In Safety Education program.
- Utilizing lodges and Masons throughout California, AARBI will set up and conduct multiple training sessions, set goals with individual departments, train the trainers, prepare the materials for distribution, create tool kits for each department, and establish reporting procedures.
- Lodges may be used as training sites for firefighters.
- AARBF will provide Masons with life-saving burn prevention materials to distribute to children in their communities.
- Masons alongside local firefighters will conduct FISE presentations that coincide with schools' schedules.
- AARBF will collect data throughout the school year for project evaluation.
