Masons and non-Masons throughout California can now visit the newest exhibit at the Henry W. Coil Library & Museum from the comfort of home or any computer lab. Visit the museum – and its new exhibit – virtually via masonicheritage.org.

The exhibit "The Legacy of the American Anti-Masonic Period, 1826-1838" offers a glimpse into the aftermath of the 1826 disappearance of Captain William Morgan and the anti-Masonic sentiment that pervaded the country at the time.

As anti-Masonry gained in popularity, the demand for inflammatory literature warning of the social evils of Freemasonry surged. Farmer's almanacs and newspapers published by anti-Masons contributed to an era of animosity that was severely damaging to the Masonic landscape.

Benjamin Franklin started a school in Philadelphia which might be called the forerunner of our present public schools. Its purpose was to prepare students for life as well as for college. The curriculum, which he established, included agriculture, government, history, grammar, navigation, surveying, chemistry and physics. His school might as well have been called the First American Academy.

The next time you pass a public school, pause a moment to think what that school means to humanity. Recall the long dark centuries when the masses were kept in ignorance, when greed and oppression ruled the world with an iron hand. From the very beginning of man's struggle for knowledge, self respect, and the recognition of his inalienable rights, the public school has been his greatest ally. We refer to the public schools as "common schools" because they belong to all of us. In them we are working together to meet a great universal need. They are relatively new. They are our country's greatest gift to civilization. Throughout the world, among upward struggling peoples, wherever parents share in the aspirations of their children, the American public school is being copied. Let us keep our public schools strong and free.


