From the East

liar system of morality, veiled in allegory and illustrated by symbols has proven itself a most valuable path for men seeking something deeper than the overabundant superficialities of daily life. I hope you attend our ceremonials with an aim towards educating the mind, nourishing the heart and partaking in merry fellowship. I hope the time spent with your mentors will be enlightening and joyful, and that with the working tools, of which you have been bestowed, you will ever endeavor to make a daily advancement in Masonic Knowledge. I know the entire Lodge looks forward to getting to know you both, and I especially look forward to seeing you at our future Entered Apprentice Formation Nights - the very best to you, my Brothers.

Bro. Alex Von Stade, Wor. Bro. Robert Eckstein and I recently returned from the 2016 Masters' and Wardens' Retreat in Monterey, CA. We found this year's program to be the very best any of us have participated in. The classes were extremely educational and thought provoking, and we found the breakout sessions to be a fruitful experience where many new ideas and potential solutions, to commonplace themes throughout most California Masonic Lodges, were heavily and collectively discussed. After the evening's classes came to a close, we three were able to have long discussions in regards to the current state of affairs at Crow Canyon; the upsides and the downsides, the bare facts verses wishful thinking, and the concept for a 5 year plan that will strengthen our Lodge at its core and help guarantee its future existence. Our prime directive was aimed at the engagement of our newest and future membership, and also how to collectively support a Lodge model that will keep them active, enthusiastic and feeling fulfilled. The largest bracket of men joining our Institution today are between the ages of 18 and 35, yet, the top three reasons why new membership retention is lacking, as found in the most recent Grand Lodge survey, is the following in no particular order 1) Lack of education 2) Lack of mentoring, solemnity and structure 3) Lack of activities that interest younger and newer members. So, even though some Lodges may be on the upswing in the application department, maintaining those members' interest, after their degrees have concluded, is a well-known challenge.

In order to help address these issues in a well organized and thoughtful manner, we three also decided to utilize one of the many tools proposed to us in our weekend's classes; hence, we have formed an Executive Committee, with one fully attended kickoff meeting on the books. This Executive Committee is composed of Wor. Bro. Kurt Allen, Bro. Don Schauer, Sr., Bro. Paul Rodriguez-Obrien, Bro. Alex Von Stade, Wor. Bro. Robert Eckstein and myself. One of the immediate changes that many will see in place is a new format for those wishing to apply for the degrees of Masonry at our Lodge. We have decided that the best 'Prospecting Program' for Crow Canyon will be as follows; applications will no longer be granted upon request, with the exception of the applicant being immediate familial legacy of a current member. Any prospect wishing to find out more about Masonry or our Lodge must attend 4 Stated Meeting Dinners where the Master will delegate a welcoming

committee of 2 different Brothers, at each dinner, to sit with, chat and engage the prospect. After which dinner, those 2 Brothers will setup separate times, within that month, to meet with the prospect socially outside of the hall for coffee, lunch, etc. and will return their, hopefully, pleasant findings to the Brethren. This will happen at 3 Stated Meeting Dinners with the 4th being where a decision will be made to then give an application to the prospect if he, or we, be still interested. This will eliminate fly-by-night candidates, promote a form of dedication and value to becoming a member, and will strengthen our Lodge by remembering that it is quality not quantity that we are after. It is only fair to both our Lodge and the prospect that we honestly gauge whether they are right for Crow Canyon (or Masonry), or if Crow Canyon is right for them, so neither side is left wanting.

Another element that we will be kicking off immediately is an informal phone survey with EAs, FCs and newly raised MMs. We want to find out why they joined, what they are interested in, and how we as a Lodge can better facilitate their wants and needs - as they are the future. And to follow up on this survey, the Executive Committee will also be holding regular Entered Apprentice, Fellow Craft and Master Mason specific Formation Nights where questions may be asked and answered, Masonic etiquette will be taught, Officer roles explained, additional proficiency help and education will be given etc. The potential formation of degree specific committees may also be a fruitful way of bonding our Brethren through their own interactions while generating new ideas for our Lodge in regards to charity, education and activities.

These are only two of the many plans we have in place to better help keep our Lodge well rounded, relevant and desirable for many years to come.

Crow Canyon Lodge will host its annual Public Schools Night on Thursday, April 21st, where we will honor teachers of the Castro Valley School District with a banquet and honorariums. I do hope that many of you will attend, for I can think of nothing more important than honoring those that teach our youth. William Butler Yeats once said 'education is not the filling of a pail, but the lighting of a fire'. A good teacher is one capable of igniting that spark, and has the capability to inspire a child's God given faculties; two of the most important being curiosity and imagination. Without education, Masonry will cease to flourish. And it is our responsibility to ensure we do our part in supporting and honoring those that go above and beyond to provide our youth with the very best, every day.



From the Grand Master of Masons of the State of California, Most Wor. David M. Perry:

"You might have read of recent events in Georgia and Tennessee where the Grand Lodges there have adopted new rules or enforced existing rules to discipline Masons because of their sexual orientation.



The Grand Lodge of Georgia ratified Grand Master McDonald's Edict No. 2015-4 at the last Annual Communication of their Grand Lodge, thereby adding the following language to their Grand Lodge law: homosexual activity with anyone subjects the offender to discipline. The Grand Lodge of Tennessee recently suspended two brothers from Masonry for violating a provision of the Tennessee Masonic Code when they posted photographs of their wedding to each other on Facebook. The Tennessee Masonic Code states that it is a Masonic offense to promote or engage in homosexual activity.

In each case, I construe these actions as a sectarian stand which is inconsistent with and does not support the General Regulations of Freemasonry. I have therefore suspended recognition of The Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of the State of Georgia and the Grand Lodge of Tennessee F. & A. M. until the next Annual Communication of our Grand Lodge.

I am happy to share with you further details about my decision, if you so desire."
