
problem solving.



Freemasonry in South

The Cape of Good Hope became a trading station in the midseventeenth century by the **Dutch East India** Company with the prime objective to



provide ship repairs, fresh produce, beef, mutton and other various supplies to the company's ships traveling to the East Indies. As time progressed to the mid-eighteenth entury, many of the Dutch colonist and sailors who worked and settled this relatively new trading post were already initiated Freemasons due to Masonry's flourish throughout the Netherlands. These men met irregularly on ships and at pubs, and quite often made Masons without any form of dispensation or charter.

This was obviously illegal. These Masons were not operating for any specific Lodge or Grand Lodge, and this left all the Masons they initiated without a Mother Lodge. Beyond Craft Masonry, these illegal Lodges would initiate Brethren into degrees as vast as the Chapter Rose Croix; it seemed they had a method of asking the Brothers present, "Who has the highest degree here?" And then in the same breathe, "Good, good! Now you will initiate all of us into it as well!"

This irregular practice did not stay the norm for very long because in 1772 specific Brethren were authorized to setup a District Grand Lodge under the auspices of The Grand East of the Netherlands. The first Lodge formed under this banner was the Lodge De Goede Hoop No. 12 (Lodge of Good Hope). This lodge attracted considered a very prominent Lodge to belong to.

As diamonds and gold were discovered in

various areas of South Africa, Freemasonry flourished and moved with the people. As more foreigners arrived in South Africa, so did their Masonic Constitutions. It should be noted that this never caused a known riff between Brethren and on occasion these Brethren would help each other out by filling in as Officers when needed – this is an example of true Masonry at work! English speaking Lodge's promoted and helped develop Afrikaan speaking Lodge's because the Brethren felt that all men were entitled to the beauties of Freemasonry in their own native tongue. Today, all the working constitutions contribute and maintain a cooperative "Masonic Home" for the elderly.

The dichotomy of the above actions will be explained here in brief. The practice of purchasing slaves as "movable pieces of Lodge inventory" was the norm until 1818. I will not develop on this subject further, but as anyone who knows their history is aware, it took quite some time and vast changes for the South African government to see the errors of their ways and to start allowing multi-cultural equality.

In 1961 the formation of the Grand Lodge of South Africa commenced with the consent of the Irish, English and Grand Lodge of the Netherlands. Currently, there are still four separate Grand Lodge constitutions working in South Africa – English Emulation, Scottish, Irish and South African. There have been few and far between discussions regarding the consolidation of all constitutions to work under the South African banner, but for now, they choose to remain independent while recognizing each other as Brethren.
